

GSA (**Graduate Student Association**): A group of graduate students who work to represent graduate student concerns and issues to the administration and find resolutions to the benefit of graduate students.

GSBA (**Gonzaga Student Body Association**): Your student government association which works to represent student concerns and issues.

Kennel: The main court in the McCarthey Athletic Center. The Kennel is home to the famous GU basketball teams along with other sports and campus activities.

Kennel Club: A group of students who primarily go to men's basketball games. If you would like to be considered for tickets for tournaments, it is important to belong to this organization and go to as many games as you are able, it is based on attendance.

Pandini's: An Italian style eatery with oven brick pizza, salads, pasta and more!

Pilgrimage: A 6-7 mile hike each September to the Cataldo Mission in Idaho sponsored by University Ministry.

Setons: A sophomore women's service organization. The 30 women chosen to be Setons coordinate service events on campus and in the community including Charity Ball and muffin sales.

Spike: Gonzaga's Bulldog mascot

St. Al's: St. Aloysius Church

Unity House: Located near Campus House and the COG, it houses the Director of Cultural Affairs, GLBT Resource Center, and the Spokane Chapter of the NAACP.

The Wall: A long wall between the CG building and the Crosby Student Center used to post messages about upcoming events.

Ambassadors: A student group who works voluntarily with the Admissions Office. The students host visitors, give campus tours, and represent GU in the community.

Bozarth: Gonzaga's retreat and conference center. The mansion is located about 20 minutes north of campus.

The Bulletin: The weekly student-run newspaper. The paper is available on Friday mornings and can be found at various locations around the campus. It is a good way to know what is happening around the campus. The Bulletin office is located in CG 430.

Brother Peter Faber House: Located at 1104 N. Dakota between the COG and the Rosauer School of Education. It is maintained for meetings, studying, and social gatherings. It is sponsored by University Ministry.

CAT: Cataldo Dining Hall is located on the north side of campus by St. Aloysius Church (affectionately called St. Al's). The dining hall has a great coffee shop - Jazzman's, casual dining - Pandini's restaurant, and is a multipurpose event facility where many activities and events are held.

CCASL: The Center for Community Action and Service Learning. This house coordinates volunteer projects throughout the Spokane for Gonzaga students and has a listing of volunteer positions.

Centennial Trial: Recreational Path that runs through Riverfront Park in Downtown Spokane, through the GU campus and continues all the way into Idaho. The trail is open to walking, biking, jogging, and rollerblading. It is also a clear path to downtown shopping at the new Riverpark Square.

College Hall: Formally called the Administration building, this is the original four-story building in the center of campus. It is home to many Core classes along with a large portion of the University's administration and student services.

Core: University academic requirements necessary for graduation.

COG: This building is located between the Crosby Student Center and the Foley Library. It contains the bookstore and dining facilities. It is also the place where many students eat regular meals.

ESL/ISP: The English as a Second Language and International Student Programs.

Fitness Center: Gonzaga's newly remodeled facility to meet all your work out needs. It has a weight room, cardio workout area, basketball court, swimming pool, and more.

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GONZAGA UNIVERSITY MISSION STATEMENT

Gonzaga University belongs to a long and distinguished tradition of humanistic, Catholic, and Jesuit education. We, the trustees, regents, faculty, administration, and staff of Gonzaga are committed to preserving and developing that tradition and communicating it to our students and alumni.

As humanistic, we recognize the essential role of human creativity, intelligence, and initiative in the construction of society and culture.

As Catholic, we affirm the heritage which has developed through two thousand years of Christian living, theological reflection, and authentic interpretation.

As Jesuit, we are inspired by the vision of Christ at work in the world, transforming it by His love, and calling men and women to work with him in loving service of the human community.

All these elements of our tradition come together within the sphere of free intellectual inquiry characteristic of a university. At Gonzaga, this inquiry is primarily focused on Western culture within which our tradition has developed.

We also believe that a knowledge of traditions and cultures different from our own draws us closer to the human family of which we are a part and makes us more aware of both the possibilities and limitations of our own heritage. Therefore, in addition to our primary emphasis on Western culture, we seek to provide for our students some opportunity to become familiar with a variety of other human cultures.

In the light of our own tradition and the variety of human societies, we seek to understand the world we live in. It is a world of great technological progress, scientific complexity, and competing ideologies. It offers great possibilities for cooperation and interdependence, but at the same time presents us with the fact of widespread poverty, hunger, injustice, and the prospect of degeneration and destruction.

We seek to provide for our students some understanding of contemporary civilization; and we invite them to reflect with us on the problems and possibilities of a scientific age, the ideological differences that separate the peoples of the world, and the rights and responsibilities that come from commitment to a free society. In this way we hope to prepare our students for an enlightened dedication to the Christian ideals of justice and peace.

Our students cannot assimilate the tradition of which Gonzaga is a part nor the variety of human cultures, nor can they understand the problems of the world, without the development and discipline of their imagination, intelligence, and moral judgment. Consequently, we are committed at Gonzaga to developing these faculties. And since what is assimilated needs to be communicated if it is to make a difference, we also seek to develop in our students the skills of effective writing and speaking.

We believe that our students, while they are developing general knowledge and skill during their years at Gonzaga, should also attain more specialized competence in at least one discipline or profession.

We hope that the integration of liberal humanistic learning and skills with a specialized competence will enable our graduates to enter creatively, intelligently, and with deep moral conviction into a variety of endeavors, and provide leadership in the arts, the professions, business, and public service.

Through its academic and student life programs, the Gonzaga community encourages its students to develop certain personal qualities: self-knowledge, self-acceptance, a restless curiosity, a desire for truth, a mature concern for others, and a thirst for justice.

Many of our students will find the basis for these qualities in a dynamic Christian faith. Gonzaga tries to provide opportunities for these students to express their faith in a deepening life of prayer, participation in liturgical worship, and fidelity to the teachings of the Gospel. Other students will proceed from a non-Christian religious background or from secular philosophic and moral principles.

We hope that all our graduates will live creative, productive, and moral lives, seeking to fulfill their own aspirations and at the same time, actively supporting the aspirations of others by a generous sharing of their gifts.

STUDENT LIFE OFFICE

In the Student Life Office, home of the Vice President for Student Life and the Dean of Student Services, we complement students' classroom experiences by becoming actively involved in extracurricular and co-curricular activities and services. Our goal is to assist students in becoming well informed, responsible, and contributing members of the Gonzaga community.

We are available to students in the following ways:

- Informing, explaining and interpreting University policy to students, and providing a basic understanding of campus life
- Assisting students in adjusting to campus life
- Providing leadership in crisis situations
- Informing students of available resources
- Guiding students in the resolution of conflicts
- Contributing to policies and programs that improve safety and security on campus
- Coordinating and presenting the Student Orientation Program which offers programs and activities for students new to Gonzaga
- Encouraging and supporting student volunteerism in both the Gonzaga and Spokane communities
- Developing and enforcing behavior standards
- Advising student government and other campus organizations
- Offering leadership development opportunities
- Serving as a resource for faculty
- Establishing and improving relations with the local neighborhood

We are here for students, helping with the myriad of problems, questions, and concerns they may have; providing services and programs to meet their needs; and encouraging their growth and development to the fullest potential. The Office of the Vice President for Student Life is located in CG 120 and can be reached at extension 4100, or mail can be sent to CG Box 76.

BOOKSTORE

Gonzaga University's bookstore provides a variety of services and supplies to our growing community, which includes faculty, staff, students, parents, alumni, the Jesuit community, and visitors to our campus.

The bookstore sells textbooks, classroom supplies, study aids, academic support items, residence hall supplies, and computer software. In addition, it sells clothing and gift merchandise with the Gonzaga name and logo and is the University's official "Team Store" for sports apparel.

COUNSELING AND CAREER ASSESSMENT CENTER

Students entering the Counseling and Career Assessment Center are seeking answers to questions concerning many and various aspects of their lives, such as their personal relationships, study habits, overindulgence problems, as well as the age old questions: who am I, and what can I do with my life to make it as productive as possible for the greater good.

OUR COUNSELORS are all professionals, each possessing years of experience in their field and are therefore well qualified to address the individual needs of the student and to do so in a short-term, "focused" type counseling. The counselor assists the student to clarify their life goals –personal, academic, and professional– and also in acquiring and developing methods for coping with obstacles encountered throughout

life. During the first session, while becoming acquainted, you and your Counselor will determine the best way The Center can serve you. Succeeding sessions will be devoted to finding ways of achieving the goals that have been established.

CONFIDENTIALITY: Visits to The Center do not become a part of your academic record; your identity and your conversations with the counselor and any disclosures made during your 50 minute appointments are kept strictly confidential. Confidential information will not be shared with anyone outside The Center without your expressed, written consent, unless there is a clear and imminent danger to yourself or another.

CAREER COUNSELING is a basic function of the Counseling and Career Assessment Center wherein you have the opportunity to work with a counselor who will help you with the 'journey inward.' This process would likely entail completing the Strong Interest Inventory and the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator and using the SIGI computer career exploration program as tools to examine your life in terms of developing a career plan. Personal agency (being self-aware and actively developing your own potential) is the message we relay to students as we assist them in developing realistic strategies to get them where they want to go. Once a career plan has been developed, we refer students to The Career Center to help prepare for the 'journey outward:' finding internships, developing a resume, practicing interview skills, and networking with others.

SPECIALIZED SERVICES: Occasionally, students have concerns that may require specialized services; our counselors can serve as consultants in the processing of referrals to appropriate community professionals. Some concerns for this specialized service include: alcohol rehabilitation, family therapy, eating disorders, chronic psychological conditions, long-term therapy, and learning disabilities.

LOCATION: The Counseling and Career Assessment Center is located in CG 303, and we can be reached by phone at extension 4054 or by calling (509)313-4054. Our office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and 1:10 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

VISITOR PARKING

Visitors to the Gonzaga campus must obtain a visitor parking permit. There is no charge for this permit. Visitor permits may be obtained at the Admissions Visit Office (CG 100), CPS&S Office, or for Law School visitors, at the Law School Library Front Desk. Students, staff, and faculty of Gonzaga are not considered to be visitors, are not to use visitor parking spaces at any time and are not eligible to have citations voided as visitors. This includes vehicles owned by students, staff, and faculty but driven by visitors.

HANDICAPPED PARKING

Handicapped parking spaces are reserved exclusively for those persons whose vehicles bear a decal, placard, or special license plate issued by a state or federal authority in accordance with RCW46.61.580. The spaces are marked with a blue and white handicap sign and are painted with a handicap designation. Detailed information regarding the issuance of handicapped parking permits may be obtained from the Dept. of Licensing. CPS&S is unable to issue handicap parking permits.

MOTORCYCLES

Motorcycles require a parking decal. Motorcycles will be parked in motor vehicle parking lots only. If stalls designated for motorcycles are filled, they may be parked in any auto stall.

CARPOOL PARKING PERMITS

Special carpool sections are available. Contact CPS&S for requirements.

A copy of the parking rules and regulations is available at the CPS&S office. Further information is available by calling the Parking office at extension 4147 or (509)313-4147 off campu

If it's business you need to conduct, offices located in the Crosby Student Center include Gonzaga Student Body Association (GSBA), Student Activities, University Ministry, Gonzaga Activities Board (GAB), Gonzaga Alumni Mentoring Program (GAMP), Gonzaga Outdoors, and the Career Center.

Crosby Student Center hours are 7:30am - midnight Monday through Friday, 11am - 8pm Saturday, and 11am-midnight Sunday. Refer to posted hours for University breaks and holidays.

DISABILITY RESOURCES, EDUCATION & ACCESS MANAGEMENT (DREAM)

DREAM provides access to Gonzaga University's programs, services, activities, and facilities for qualified students with disabilities in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and Washington State laws. DREAM may arrange or provide appropriate academic adjustments, reasonable accommodations, auxiliary aids, assistive technology, advocacy, and other types of a assistance for students with disabilities.

Students should contact DREAM to inquire about the procedure for securing academic adjustments or accommodations. Students are encouraged to contact DREAM at least four weeks prior to the semester for which they are requesting services. The DREAM Office is located in 2nd floor of the Foley Library. FINANCIAL AID

Financial Aid programs at Gonzaga University are designed to provide assistance in the form of grants, scholarships, loans, employment opportunities, or a combination of these to all eligible students. The Financial Aid Office administers these financial aid programs on an annual basis, and financial aid recipients are assigned a specific financial aid counselor each year. APPLICATION DEADLINES ARE CRUCIAL. The annual priority filing deadline for the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is February 1. Specific application information and associated deadlines are available from the Financial Aid Office.

CIRCULATION PRIVILEGES - Library books circulate for 2 months to graduate students and may be renewed. All materials taken from the library must be checked out at the Circulation Desk. ID CARDS ARE REQUIRED FOR ALL LIBRARY TRANSACTIONS. Unpaid library overdue fines or lost book charges will result in a hold on all transcripts and/or future registration. Fines are assessed for overdue books. Distance students may have books mailed to them. See the Distance Services page for more information www.foley.gonzaga.edu/distance.

PERIODICALS AND NEWSPAPERS - Current issues of newspapers and periodicals are available in the current periodicals area located in the lower level. Back issues are shelved in the stacks in the lower level. Through the Foley website, students also have access to over 30,000 full text journals and newspapers. Use the "Periodicals@Foley" link on the homepage to determine how to access specific journal titles.

ARTICLE INDEXES AND DATABASES - Foley Center provides access to over 100 online indexes and databases for use by our students doing research. These databases cover a wide range of subjects, and a complete list is available from the Foley homepage. Many of the databases have links to the full text of journal articles.

RESEARCH GUIDES - The library has developed many subject-specific research guides to assist our students in using library materials. On the Foley homepage, there are links to guides in the subject areas taught at Gonzaga.

REFWORKS - RefWorks is a web-based bibliography and database manager that allows you to create your own personal database by importing references from text files or online databases and other various sources. You can use these references in writing papers and automatically format the paper and the bibliography in minutes. The link to RefWorks is on the library homepage.

ONE on ONE CONSULTATIONS – The reference staff is available to meet with students for one on one consultations to help with the research process. Call (509)313-3834, (800)498-5941, or email the Reference Desk (refdesk@gonzaga.edu), and ask to schedule a meeting time with one of the librarians. Traffic Regulations

- Campus speed limit is 10 MPH.
- Driving over the speed limit or in a reckless manner is prohibited.
- Driving on sidewalks, brick areas, or lawns is prohibited.
- Operators/passengers on motorcycles or mopeds are required to wear a protective helmet.
- Operators of motorcycles and certain mopeds require a motorcycle endorsement on their driver's license.
- Failure to stop for a stop sign will result in the issuance of a citation.

Hours of Enforcement

University parking regulations are enforced year round unless otherwise specified. **Red, orange, and green lots are enforced 8 a.m. until 8 p.m., Monday through Friday,** excluding University holidays and breaks. Yellow, purple and teal lots are enforced 24 hours, 7 days, year round. Fire lanes, reserved stalls, disabled person stalls, lawn areas and maintenance areas are enforced 24 hours, 7 days, year round. After 5 p.m. anyone with a valid parking permit may park in the red, orange, and green lots.

PLEASE NOTE:

- Jesuit House parking is reserved for residents, visitors, and employees of Jesuit House.
- Parking is not allowed against the south side of the Knights of Columbus building or in the lot to the east. This is posted for Knights of Columbus and St. Aloysius Parish patrons only, and they may tow any vehicles in that lot at their discretion.

Parking Citations and Fines

If you receive a parking citation, carefully read the instructions printed on the back. As an incentive to pay fines promptly, a reduced fine schedule is in effect for **7 calendar days** after the date of issuance. The fine for prompt payment is one-half the regular fine. The regular, full fine takes effect on the 8th calendar day after issuance.

Students may pay their fines at Student Accounts (CG 024). Unpaid fines will be charged against the student's account.

Staff/faculty and administration members may pay fines at the Controller's office (CG 110). Unpaid fines may be collected through payroll deduction. Any parking fines that cannot be collected through payroll deduction, or parking fines for vehicles not registered through CPS&S will be sent to an outside collection agency when they become past due.

Permits

Parking permits may be purchased at the CPS&S Office, lower level of Welch Hall. When registering your vehicle, the following information is required:

- 1. Name, address, and ID #
- 2. Year, make, model, and color of vehicle
- 3. State of registration and license plate number
- 4. Signed authorization form acknowledging regulations and agreement to abide by them.

Parking permits shall be displayed as directed at the time of purchase. Parking is assigned by lot (color-coded) and the vehicle is authorized only in the lots designated by the color of the permit purchased. All motor vehicles with current permits are allowed to park in the Martin Centre parking lot and the lot on the northeast corner of Boone and Cincinnati. It is permissible to move your parking decal from one vehicle to another; however, all vehicles using that parking permit must be registered. Gonzaga community members who do not purchase decals 27

curity," then "Parking" to appeal. You may also appeal by filling out an appeal form in the CPS&S Office, lower level of Welch Hall. You may ONLY appeal citations online or in person if your vehicle is registered with Campus Security. If your vehicle is not registered with Campus Security, you have forfeited your right to an appeal. All appeals must be received electronically or in writing, within five days of the date on the citation (date of issuance, not included), and must include your license plate number, mailing address, and citation number.

Parking and Traffic Regulations

The regulations contained herein are applicable to all persons who operate a motor vehicle on the property of Gonzaga University.

Parking Regulations

GONZAGA UNIVERSITY REQUIRES ALL VEHICLES
(including motorcycles) PARKING ON UNIVERSITY PROPERTY TO BE REGISTERED WITH CPS&S AND DISPLAY A VALID PARKING PERMIT. Visitor's cars are registered when they get their visitor parking permits. Visitor's Permits are available at the CPS&S Office, the Switchboard, and the Admissions Visit Office.

Parking permits shall be displayed as directed at the time of purchase. Parking is assigned by lot (color-coded) and the vehicle is authorized only in the lots designated by the color of the permit purchased. All motor vehicles with current permits are allowed to park in the Martin Centre parking lot and the lot on the northeast corner of Boone and Cincinnati.

If you loan your vehicle to a friend/relative, you are obligated to inform them of the parking rules and regulations. Registered owners are liable for all citations issued to their vehicles regardless of who was driving at the time of the infraction.

Vehicles parked on the city streets are regulated by Washington State statutes and Spokane City/County codes and ordinances. Spokane Police patrol campus and issue city parking citations. Campus Security/Parking Services has no authority in citations issued by city/state enforcement agencies.

The following practices are prohibited:

- Parking on sidewalks or lawn areas.
- Parking in fire lanes.
- Parking on brick areas.
- Parking within 30 feet of a stop sign.
- Parking within 20 feet of crosswalk.
- Parking in more than one space or in an unmarked space.
- Parking in a University lot without displaying proper parking decal.
- Falsifying and/or using a falsified decal.
- Purchasing, attempting to purchase, obtaining, or displaying a parking permit using false information or by fraudulent means.
- Parking in unauthorized or restricted areas.

Besides wanting to create an environment free of harassment and discrimination, Gonzaga realizes the need to provide programs and activities meant to foster an open embracing community for GLBTQ students. The GLBT Resource Center is housed in Unity House Multicultural Education Resource Center and provides educational resources, coordinates educational programs, as well as opportunities for community engagement. It provides support for students with issues related to sexual orientation or gender identity/expression. In the center there are informational brochures on local and national resources for the GLBT community, a student lounge and meeting space with a computer, cable TV, and publications. Most of all it is a safe space for students to find support and resources. GONZAGA ALUMNI MENTOR PROGRAM (GAMP)

Gonzaga Alumni Mentor Program is a career development and networking program designed for Gonzaga University students, alumni, and friends. It works by matching students and graduates with mentors who share similar career fields, geographic locations, or other criteria of interest. The program's primary goal is to establish a relationship between the mentee and mentor that facilitates better career decision-making and the development of a network that can result in increased job opportunities.

GAMP offers mentee orientations Monday through Friday to help students understand the value of networking and contacting their mentors. They have a database of over 2,500 volunteer mentors nationwide who want to help students in their search for career advice, résumé-building, and establishing a network of people to turn to when they graduate. The GAMP office is located on the second floor of Crosby, room 213. Call extension 4048 or (509)313-4048 off campus, or email gamp@gonzaga.edu.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIPS

Graduate Assistantships are granted as a means to improve the quality of applicants, to attract better qualified students who would not come without financial aid, to increase enrollment, and to enable some students to attend who otherwise could not. Assistantships can vary depending on department. They can be an hourly wage or a monthly stipend that can be applied to tuition. Additionally, they can provide for the waiver of no more than one-half the credit hours required for a degree, and those credit hours can only be graduate credit hours.

Graduate Assistantships are offered in several departments and schools. Applications and questions regarding assistantships may be directed to the school or department in which the student will enroll. (Note: A portion of Graduate Assistantships represents taxable income to the recipient.)

HEALTH/MEDICAL RESOURCES

Gonzaga operates an on-campus Health Center, which is a walk-in medical clinic for students only. Its focus is to provide health care education and primary medical care in order for students to return them to their classes as quickly as possible. Please schedule an appointment for a visit with a physician or a registered nurse by calling extension 4052 or (509)313-4052 off campus. All records are maintained in a separate confidential file.

The physician appointments are scheduled. Specific services include:

Physician's appointments

- Wellness education with an emphasis on self responsibility
- Treatment of injuries and illness
- Diagnostic testing (e.g., all blood tests, strep throat, mono)
- Immunizations are available for measles, hepatitis A & B, meningitis, tetanus
- Medical supplies i.e., crutches, splints, and slings
- Observation room
- Follow-up care and referrals

All full time students are eligible for services. Fees that may be incurred, i.e., physician's visits, laboratory tests, immunizations, allergy injections, medication, supplies, hospitalization, x-rays or diagnostic tests, urgent care visits, ER's, etc., are the responsibility of the student. The Health Center's services are different from an insurance plan, but any of our fees may be submitted by you to your insurance carrier to be part of your insurance history.

Family Medicine is on-call at (509)624-2313, and a 24-hour consulting service is available after hours at (509)324-6464.

Pregnancy

For any student who is pregnant or is concerned about the possibility of pregnancy, there are helpful resources on campus and in the community that can be of assistance. INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

Information Technology Services (ITS) provides service and support to the entire Gonzaga campus in the use of technology. ITS is comprised of four divisions: CIO Office, Central Computing and Network Support Services, Client Support Services, and Technology Education Services.

Central Computing and Network Support Services (CCNSS)

CCNSS is located in the lower level of College Hall. The department operates and maintains the central computing center, which houses a variety of corporate computing servers and networking equipment. CCNSS also manages and maintains the campus wired and wireless network.

These accounts include 250MB of storage for e-mail, the student's web page, and

The library has a commitment to providing high quality services to our distance learners. There is a link for distance students on the Foley homepage that answers questions regarding library services. We also have a distance services librarian who works exclusively with our distance students. How do I copy information I can't check out from the library?

The library has 2 black and white and one color copier that are available for use when printing from the computer terminals or making photocopies. Students put money into a printing account at the library and use their ID card to make copies. There is also one coin operated copier in the building.

How do I check out books at other libraries or search their catalog?

Your GU library card works at the Gonzaga Law Library, Whitworth College, North Idaho College, University of Idaho, Idaho Law Library, the Spokane Community Colleges, and numerous public libraries in North Idaho. You can search their catalogs online by choosing WIN Borrow from the catalog homepage. You can also place holds on material from those libraries and have it sent to Gonzaga for your use.

PARKING

All students, staff, and faculty who park a vehicle on Gonzaga University property must register the vehicle with CPS&S. This applies to all vehicles brought to campus, including motorcycles. Vehicles can be registered at the CPS&S office, Welch hall, lower west side. Permit sale dates/times are posted at the beginning of each semester at the Security office, Switchboard, and via email. The permit must be properly displayed in the vehicle. An owner/driver may register multiple vehicles to a permit, providing that only one vehicle is on campus at a time, and the permit is displayed in that vehicle. By registering a vehicle, the owner/driver acknowledges their responsibility to abide by all rules and regulations. The holder of the permit is responsible for any citation the vehicle receives, regardless of who was operating the vehicle at the time. Visitors must obtain a visitor pass from the Switchboard, Admissions Visit Office, Law library circulation desk, or by prior arrangement by calling extension 4147 or (509)313-4147 off campus.

Parking lots are designated and posted by permit color and are restricted to particular groups (staff/faculty, law students, residence halls, rental units, etc.). A list of locations is provided at the time of registration or is available at the Security office. Parking enforcement is conducted year round, but hours and conditions vary depending on the time of year. Reserved spaces for disabled persons and maintenance vehicles, loading zones, fire lanes, campus interior, residential lots, and other violations are enforced 24 hours a day year round. Please note that purchasing a parking permit does not guarantee a space in a particular lot.

Violation fees are printed on the citation. Prompt payment (within seven days of the date on the citation) results in the fee being reduced. Unpaid citations are posted to a student's account. Staff/faculty may have fees collected through payroll deduction. Unpaid citations issued to vehicles not registered with Campus Security are sent to a collection agency when they become past due.

Citations may be appealed online through the Gonzaga CPS&S website. Go to www.gonzaga.edu, click "Student Life," then click "Campus Public Safety & Se-25

- 5. Notice that the total number of titles available for your section is listed in the upper right hand corner of the shelf tag.
- 6. Some titles may be optional or recommended, so be sure to look for this information on the lower left-handed corner of the tag.
- 7. If there are no books on the shelf, check the last line of the shelf tag for a listing of any other courses that may also be using the book.
- 8. A red mark on the bottom of the pages or a yellow "used book" sticker on the back can identify used books.
- 9. Bookstore employees are happy to help you find books so please do not hesitate to ask for assistance.

FOLEY LIBRARY BOOK SMARTS

How do I get a library card?

Gonzaga students, staff, and faculty are issued ID cards when they first come to campus. ID cards are used to checkout materials and to use the printing service.

How do I know if I have fines?

If you returned or renewed a book late you will be fined. Books that are damaged or lost may also have charges. You can check your library account online or by calling the Circulation Desk at (509)313-5803.

How do I renew a book?

You can do a lot of things online with your card, including renewing your books. All items can be renewed up to eight times, unless someone else has requested them. Books from the Popular Collection may only be renewed twice. Reserve items cannot be renewed at all. Interlibrary loan books might be able to renewed, but we must first ask the lending library. IIL renewal requests are processed through the IL-Liad webpage. Of course, you can always call and renew your items and ask questions (509)313-5803.

Someone checked out the book I need! How do I get my hands on it?

If Foley library owns a book you want, but it is currently checked out, you have several options. You can place a hold on the book using the online catalog and your card information. The person who has it will not be able to renew the item. When they return it, an email will be sent to notify you, and it will be held at the Circulation Desk for seven days or mailed to you if you are a distant student. If you need the item right away, you can call (509)313-5893 and have a "recall" put on the book. The book will then be returned within seven days. We will inform you when the book has been returned.

How do I use the catalog and databases from home?

Anyone can use the library catalog from home. Most of the databases will require a password to log on. The user name and password are the same as you use to log into Blackboard or Zagmail. If you don't know your user name and password, call the Information Technology Help Desk at (509)313-5550.

How do I check the status of Interlibrary Loan (ILL) book?

You can call the ILL department at (509)313-6534 to find out about the status of a book. If you login to ILLiad, you can also check the status of your requests and request renewals.

What if I don't live in Spokane?

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documents that are accessible from any of the computer labs on campus. Access to the student's Barney e-mail account is available from anywhere with an internet connection. Barney accounts can be picked up during normal working hours at the Computer Center in CG 016. For more information call extension 5550 or 6844.

Client Support Services

The friendly staff of this department manages the only 24 hour computer lab on campus, which is located in College Hall, Room 131. The lab houses networked workstations and a multi-functional printer, allowing access to campus resources as well as the Internet. Client Support Services also provides assistance to students in their setup and connection to ZagNet, Gonzaga's residence hall network. To request ZagNet assistance, or assistance in configuring laptops to access the Gonzaga Community Wireless Network, please call the IT Service Desk at extension 5550 or (509)313-5550 off campus.

Technology Education Services (TES)

TES assists students and faculty with the use of audio visual and multimedia presentation equipment in the classroom. To request media support, call extension 3875 or (509)313-3875 off campus. Additionally, this department provides a wide range of additional technology services to the University Community, such as duplication of non-copyrighted video materials, European video format conversion, photography, computer graphics, and file scanning services. A cuts-only VHS video-editing suite is also available for student use on a first come first serve basis.

Blackboard Information

This is an on-line option that many professors use in order to continue classroom discussions or enhance them. Blackboard is the web based courseware provided to faculty to aid in course instruction. The students are automatically joined to classes when they register for the class. Every course has a Blackboard section created, but it is up to the instructor's discretion to utilize it and when to make it available.

Your department will send a request for an account for email and Blackboard. The same account/username and password will allow you to access both systems as well as the logon to campus computers. The information (user names and passwords) is given back to your department for distribution. Another option is to stop in to CG 016 with a GU ID card, and someone in Central Computing can create an account for you.

Wireless Access Around Gonzaga

Wireless is presently campus-wide. Accessing the wireless varies by device type and operating system. Each device must be self registered via web site. Connect to "Gonzaga Community Network" with the wireless device. You will be prompted for your user name and password (same account as email and Blackboard). When completed you will to restart your browser. If you need assistance in accessing the Gonzaga Community Wireless Network, you can bring the device to the IT Service Desk in Foley Center 017D.

JUNDT ART MUSEUM

The Jundt Art Museum, which was funded by a major contribution from James R. and Joann Jundt, private donations, and grants, opened its doors in the Fall of 1995. The

Museum includes the Jundt Galleries: a 2,800 square-foot exhibition area; the Arcade Gallery: a 1,288 square-foot exhibition space; and a 1,450 square-foot exhibition lounge. The exhibition lounge was dedicated to Rev. Bernard Coughlin, S.J., in September 1999 as the Chancellor's Room. It houses selections from Gonzaga University's collection of Chihuly glass, including the permanent installation of the Gonzaga Red Chandelier. The Museum exhibits works of art from its permanent collection which includes contemporary and old master works. The University's extensive print collection is housed in the Print Study Room, which is available to students and visitors by appointment. The collection may also be viewed electronically via the public access kiosk in the lobby of the museum. Major exhibitions, which include local, regional, national, and international artists, take place throughout the year and include the Senior Exhibit.

The Charlotte Y. Martin Foundation Lecture Hall, an 86-seat lecture room which joins the museum wing to the Art Department, accommodates both academic lectures and museum events.

The Jundt Art Museum sits 100 feet north of the Spokane River on the southwest edge of the Gonzaga campus between the Schoenberg Conference Center and the Jepson Center. The extension is 6611 or (509)313-6611 off campus.

MARTIN CENTRE

The Martin Centre consists of more than 83,000 square feet of indoor training space which houses the majority of the offices for the Athletic Department. The Martin Centre includes two basketball or volleyball courts, a golf practice area, an athlete's weight room, locker rooms, and an athletic training room. The Martin Centre is the home of the Gonzaga University Volleyball team and is primarily used for Gonzaga Volleyball games and other athletic team practices. MCCARTHEY ATHLETIC CENTER

The McCarthey Athletic Center, built at a cost of 25 million dollars, was completed in October of 2004. The new arena features a seating capacity of 6,000 and is the home of the Men's and Women's basketball teams. The McCarthey Athletic Center contains two 9' x 16' video walls and two 100' video ribbon boards. The arena also includes six luxury suites, a new club room containing 9 TV's, 5,000 sq. ft. training and meeting space for the crew teams, new office space for a portion of the Gonzaga athletic department and the men's and women's basketball staffs, four visiting locker rooms, and 40 points of sale at 6 permanent and 6 portable concession stands.

RUDOLF FITNESS CENTER

The Rudolf Fitness Center is a 38,000 sq. ft. facility with a full line of cardiovascular and weight areas. Also available are four racquetball courts, two aerobics rooms, three full basketball/volleyball courts, a running track, a six lane 25-yard swimming pool, and a smoothie snack bar.

All individuals must have their valid GU ID card to gain access to the Rudolf Fitness Center. Graduate and Law students may purchase a semester membership through the Student Accounts Office in College Hall room 024. For more information about memberships,

The refund period varies depending on the time you buy so be aware of the refund calendar (provided at the point of purchase). If you buy at the beginning of the semester, you will have a one-week window, after the first day of class, in which books are fully refundable. After that, refunds are issued up to three business days following the date of purchase. If you choose to use other textbook sources, be very careful that you are buying the correct edition. Since new editions usually represent a 20% or greater change in content over the previous older editions may not be acceptable. Likewise, some textbooks are sold as brief or complete editions.

Used Books: The best way to reduce your textbook costs is to find as many used books as possible. By utilizing the used book system, you can lower your textbook costs by as much as 50%. Shop early. Used book inventories peak in the bookstore about two weeks before classes begin.

Selling Books: Consider selling back books outside of your major. If your book will be used again next term and there is sufficient demand, the bookstore will buy your book for up to 50% of the price you paid for it. Otherwise, you will have the opportunity to sell to a used book company at market price during the same Finals Week buyback. Ask your professor if your book will be used again next term. You may want to hold your book for one semester to get the 50% price. Ask the book buyer for the price being paid for each of your books. Know the copyright date and remember that most books, if not annuals, will be replaced by a new edition every two to three years and lose their value completely. Try to sell your books early. If the bookstore only needs 50 copies of a title, the 51st student to sell may experience a significant drop in value as the book is shipped off to a used book wholesaler. Take care of your books. Use pencil rather than pen for filling in blanks. Limit the number of colors you use when highlighting and generally, protect the book from water or binding damage.

Book Shortages: Sometimes, due to higher than expected enrollment, shipping or printing problems, the bookstore will run out of books. You can avoid some of these shortages by shopping early. If you can't find your book be sure to ask for assistance from bookstore employees. If the bookstore has run out of your book, fill in an out of stock card and drop if off the Customer Service Desk. The bookstore will try to get you a copy as quickly as possible; they will call you when it arrives and put it on reserve for 10 business days. Restocked books will be sold to students on a first come first serve basis. If you forgot to submit an out of stock card, the bookstore will assume that you have purchased a book from another source.

Navigating the Bookstore: All the information you need to find your textbook is on your course schedule (Need a copy? Ask at the Customer Service Desk).

- 1. Books are shelved alphabetically by subject code from ACCT (accounting) in the front of the section to THEA (theatre) and VART (visual arts) on the back wall of the bookstore.
- 2. Once you find the subject code that you are looking for, note that books are then organized numerically by course and the by section. Different sections often use different books so read the shelf tags carefully.
- 3. Instructors change so ignore the faculty names and focus on your section number.
- 4. Each shelf unit reads like a book, left to right, top to bottom before it hops

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS GONZAGA STUDENT BODY ASSOCIATION (GSBA)

GSBA provides a forum wherein students' concerns are addressed. Our primary directive is to provide leadership in the support of Gonzaga community development through the sponsorship of clubs, activities, and forums for student interaction and participation. Ideally, GSA members will serve a 1-2 year commitment. If for any reason, a GSA member is unable to continue on GSA, the member will be responsible for orienting their replacement to membership on GSA.

In accordance with the GSA's partnership with the Gonzaga Student Body Association (GSBA), two members selected from GSA may run for elected positions to serve on GSBA. These two representatives will be required to attend GSBA Senate meetings and serve as a liaison between the two organizations.

Who has control?

Currently, all members of the council share government of the council equally. Future GSA council members may elect to delegate positions or restructure government of the council in whatever way best serves the needs of GSA and the representation of graduate students.

Two advisors for the GSA, one will be appointed by Student Life and one by the Academic Vice President. The Chair or president is selected by the voting members of the GSA. Also, a member from the GSA usually assists with the responsibility of keeping records, meeting minutes, and providing pertinent handouts to GSA members at meetings.

When do we meet?

GSA usually convenes at least one meeting per month from October thru April. Each meeting is about 1-2 hours long. The Chair in collaboration with the advisors will notify all members of GSA of the first scheduled meeting. At the initial meeting of the year, the representatives from the Administration will submit proposed agenda items for the upcoming year. Each agenda item must be approved by a 2/3 vote from the GSA council. Members of GSA may also propose agenda items to be addressed.

Also at the initial meeting – time, date, and location, which are most convenient for monthly meetings, will be determined. The Chair will draft a tentative agenda and meeting schedule to have available by the time of the second GSA meeting. Review of the fund distribution will occur during the first meeting.

Please feel free to attend any meeting of the GSA. Although we only have one voting member per department at this point, we welcome visitors and input!

How are funds distributed and who is eligible?

Funds are distributed through Student Life and the allocation of the GSA. Any student and/or department is eligible, although we can only guarantee funding to those departments that have active representatives in the GSA.

Orientation Funding

Limited funds are available for orientation meetings, dinners and activities.

Individual Funding to Attend Conferences

Any student may apply for funding to help cover travel/program costs for academic conferences or seminars. The student should be able to demonstrate that he/she will be academically active in the function.
